The week after the convention, on August 26th, Peter DePaola ran 7.46 miles (12K) in Quantico VA to honor and remember our fallen brothers and sisters from two years ago who were killed in the August 26,



2021 bombing at the Abbey Gate in Afghanistan.

Peter is an active member of MCL Peter P. Monaco, Jr. Det. 40. The challenging course, organized by the Marine Corps Marathon, goes through the grounds of the Officer Candidates School (OCS) at Marine Corps Base, Quantico, VA. It offers a unique access to the training area for future Marines. There were 630 finishers in the event and

Peter placed first in his age division. Peter was commissioned in August 1977 upon graduation from OCS. He was excited to return to where he earned his EGA 46 years ago and became a Marine officer.

The Connecticut Department of Veterans Affairs [DVA] hosted its annual Stand Down event on Friday, September 22, 2023. Stand Down took place statewide across five locations, including Norwich at Veteran's Rally Point, Bristol at St. Gregory the Great CCD Center organized by Veteran Strong Community Center, Inc., Bridgeport at the University of Bridgeport, Danbury at the City of Danbury War Memorial, and at the DVA's main campus in Rocky Hill.

Concurrent Stand Down locations allow for Veterans and active service members to access a multitude of local programs and providers in the communities in which they live. This year, over 130 state, federal, and community providers were available to assist Veterans and active- duty military with a range of services including flu vaccines, dental, hearing, and vision screenings, legal services, CT Department of Motor Vehicle services, VA Healthcare, employment services, transportation to Stand Down provided by the Department of

Transportation, lunch, and an array of free items ranging from toiletries to winter coats. Over 1,200 Veterans and service members attended CT Stand Down 2023 across the five locations. It was an incredible day which showcased how interagency partnerships equate to robust and comprehensive services being provided to our Veterans and military communities.

IMPORTANT EVENTS AROUND THE STATE



Greetings from South Eastern CT. Thames River Detachment #1334 recently lost one of its Charter Members, Thomas "Doc" Williamson. He was 79 years old. He enlisted in the Marine Corps and then became a Navy Corpsman. His actions during the Vietnam War caused the enemy to put a \$150,000 bounty on him, dead or alive. Between Vietnam tours he served on the medical staff of Pres. Nixon. While in country he suffered numerous wounds which affected his health his whole life.

Both legs were amputated as a result of the war. Many sections of his DD214 were classified, a partial listing if his awards include: The Silver Star, Bronze Star with Oak Leaf, and five Purple Hearts. He was medically discharged after serving twenty years at 100% disability with the rank of Chief Hospital Corpsman (E8). In 2021 he was inducted in the Connecticut Veterans Hall of Fame. Although he was physically incapacitated, Doc was always there with a happy greeting and a smile. Always ready to offer advice but never overbearing. With his husband Bill, his service dog Peaches, he was always a welcome sight. His wish was to be buried in his Marine Corps green uniform in Arlington National Cemetery. He will be buried there on November 9th.




