military assignments. In addition to clerical work, their numbers included parachute riggers, mechanics, radio operators, map makers, motor transport support, and welders. By June 1944, women reservists made up 85 percent of the enlisted personnel on duty at Headquarters, Marine Corps and almost two-thirds of the personnel manning all major posts and stations in the United States and Hawaii. Following the surrender of Japan, demobilization of the Women's Reserve proceeded rapidly, but a number of them returned to service as regulars under the 1948 Act. "

The 1948 Act is when Women Marines became a permanent part of the regular Marine Corps on 12 June 1948 when Congress passed the Women's Armed Services Integration Act (Public Law 625), but they had already proved themselves in two world wars.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

LIVING THE MARINE CORPS VALUE OF HONOR

The Marine Corps' core value of courage is the inner strength that enables us to do what is right, to adhere to a higher standard of personal conduct, and to make tough decisions under stress and pressure (USMC.MIL)

Courage is the ability to confront fear, pain, danger, uncertainty, or intimidation despite feeling apprehensive. It is not the absence of fear, but rather the recognition of fear and the willingness to move forward anyway. True courage often manifests in various forms, each uniquely challenging and significant in its own right.

Courage, by definition, is something that is hard to do. If you do something without fear, then you are not being courageous – you're just being you! To be courageous, you have to be pushing through fear and uncertainty.

The story of the four Chaplains, a Catholic, a Jew, and two Protestants, stands out as an incredible act of courage to God, their fellow service members, and to our country. During World War II, the US Transport Ship Dorchester was part of a three-ship convoy traveling across the icy waters of Newfound-



land toward the American Base in Greenland. The Dorchester was crowded to capacity, carrying 902 service members, crew, and civilians. On February 3, 1943, at 0055 hours, the ship was struck by three enemy torpedoes. Within 25 minutes, the USAT Dorchester would roll onto its keel and sink.



During that brief time, through the chaos and pandemonium, the four Army chaplains set out to do their work. Quickly and quietly, they spread out among the soldiers. They tried to calm the frightened, tend to the wounded, and guide the disoriented toward safety. Witnesses of that terrible night remember hearing the four men offering prayers for the dying and encouragement for those who would live.

When a soldier couldn't find his life jacket, one of the Chaplains took off his own life vest and gave it to the frightened

man. The four Chaplains comforted the fleeing men and prayed with them. One survivor recounted, "As I swam away from the ship, I looked back. The flares had lit everything. The bow came up high and she slid under. The last thing I saw, the four Chaplains praying for the safety of the men." Another survivor testified that "the Chaplains had climbed on the keel, and they were standing arm in arm" before they slid into the icy waters. Of the 902 lives onboard, only 229 survived. That night, the four Chaplains passed the ultimate test; in doing so, they became an enduring example of extraordinary faith, courage, and selflessness. We may never be faced with the decision to go down with the ship to save others, but we can sacrifice time each day to be kind to others, listen to others, or give a call to others.

The Four Chaplains Memorial Foundation continues to honor the legacy of the Four Chaplains with its Legion of Honor Awards program. This program recognizes selfless service in many forms throughout our communities, schools, veteran service organizations, and neighborhoods.

The Legion of Honor Award Program consisting of six honorable awards, publicly recognizes and pays tribute to outstanding members of society whose lives model the giving spirit and unconditional service to community, nation, and humanity without regard to race, religion, or creed exemplified by the Four Chaplains. 


